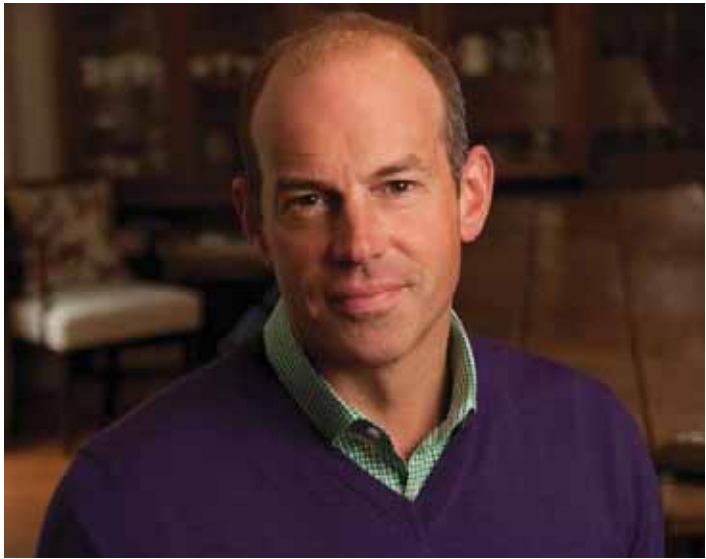

Beyond the Dram: **The Future of Highland Whisky Tourism**

For decades, the Scotch whisky industry has been a cornerstone of our Highland economy. But as we navigate 2026, the landscape is shifting. Recent announcements, such as the closure of the visitor centre at Clynelish, signal a period of recalibration across the sector.

While the distillery itself continues its vital production, the shuttering of such a high-profile visitor hub is a clear indicator that the industry is moving away from the era of unchecked tourism expansion toward a more cautious, sustainable future.

The “golden era” of whisky tourism, where growth seemed infinite, is being replaced by a necessary focus on efficiency and genuine value. For business leaders, this is a moment to pivot. We are no longer just selling a tour; we are curating experiences that must justify their existence in a tougher economic climate. The challenge now is to maintain the allure of the Highlands while managing the overheads and operational realities that even the biggest players are facing.

This reset offers an opportunity for innovation. As large-scale visitor centres face scrutiny, there is a gap for more intimate, authentic, and hyper-local experiences.

The future of Highland tourism lies in dispersal – directing footfall to the wider, less-frequented areas of our region – and collaborating with local crafts, culinary pairings, and outdoor operators.

Ultimately, the future of our industry rests on authentic engagement. Whether it is through digital integration or offering exclusive, small-group experiences, our goal remains the same: to turn a simple visit into a lasting memory. By focusing on sustainability and community-led growth rather than mere volume, we can ensure that our Highland whisky industry remains as resilient and storied as the spirit itself.

At Inverness Whisky Tours, our commitment goes beyond the glass. We pride ourselves on bridging the gap between local heritage and global enthusiasm, welcoming guests from every corner of the globe to experience the true heart of our industry. By championing authentic, small-group storytelling and supporting regional sustainability, we ensure every visitor leaves not just with a dram, but with a deep, lasting connection to the Highlands we call home.

Building resilient services by protecting the people behind them

Across the health and charity sectors there is an extraordinary commitment from the people who show up every day to support others. In many organisations that commitment stretches far beyond job descriptions, particularly where resources are tight and demand for services continues to grow.

That dedication is something to be celebrated. It also brings a responsibility for those in leadership roles. When services rely too heavily on goodwill and personal resilience alone, the pressure can fall on the very people who make those services possible.

At The Oxygen Works in Inverness, our team has supported the community through some incredibly challenging years. Their care, compassion and determination ensure

that people living with neurological and complex health conditions continue to access therapies and support that help them live their best lives.

Recently our board and management team made the difficult decision to introduce one non-operational day each week. This temporary change allows us to protect the wellbeing of our team while creating space to strengthen the organisation behind the services we deliver.

The time will be used to invest in staff development, strengthen partnerships and focus on funding activity. Just as importantly, it gives us the opportunity to recruit additional team members in the coming months so we can grow our capacity and rebuild with a workforce operating within a more sustainable pace.

This decision is not about reducing ambition or stepping back from our mission. It is about protecting our ability to deliver it. By creating space now, we are ensuring that our services remain strong, resilient and ready to grow alongside the needs of the communities we support.

In sectors built on compassion and care, leadership must reflect those same values internally as well as externally. Protecting the people behind our services is not about stepping back from growth or ambition. It is about creating the conditions where both our people and our services can thrive.

Cobbs reappointed for

PORT OF CROMARTY FIRTH

GIFT SHOP

A team of local staff will continue welcoming visitors to the Port of Cromarty Firth after Highland business Cobbs was reappointed to run the sole retail outlet at the Invergordon Service Base.

The quayside gift shop is located on the direct route passengers take to leave the port, offering a convenient opportunity to buy quality Scottish gifts and local produce, while being encouraged to explore the town and wider area.

Led by Manager Elaine Macleod, the six staff all live nearby and enjoy meeting the thousands of passengers that arrive at the port every year.

Elaine said, "Cruise passengers want a warm, authentic Highland welcome and having a local team makes a real difference. We've built the shop up over the last few years by listening to what visitors are looking for, and now stock a wide range of gifts and produce from more than 50 Scottish suppliers, including Highland makers.

We'll be open for every ship call, and we always encourage people to head into Invergordon – which has plenty to offer as we want visitors to make the most of their day here."

Cobbs' plans for the gift shop include a comprehensive selection of Scottish brands and Highland-based producers, with a dedicated area promoting Invergordon, the Cromarty Firth and local makers. The shop also holds an alcohol licence to showcase local and

regional distilleries and producers – including Invergordon Gin, with profits from the gin going to charity.

More than 180,000 cruise passengers visited the Cromarty Firth in 2025, and 2026 is looking to be another busy year, with 95 ships scheduled to visit.

The new contract was awarded to cover the 2026 and 2027 cruise seasons, with an option to extend for a third year. It continues the relationship established between the trust port and Cobbs in 2019.

Elaine added, "It's brilliant meeting people from all over the world and saying 'this is our wee bit of the Highlands'. As locals, we're happy to point visitors towards other shops and places in Invergordon, so they get the full experience."

Invergordon has been a key port of call for the cruise industry for almost 50 years. The industry has grown steadily and now contributes millions of pounds to Highland businesses and communities every year.

The first ship of 2026 is scheduled to arrive on 6 April.

The HMP Highland Project

The His Majesty's Prison Highland project continues to deliver strong and meaningful social value for the local community.

To date, the project has generated over £23 million in added social value through local procurement, community benefits, education initiatives and employment. Our teams have raised and donated £27,000 for local causes, supported by an impressive

475 volunteering hours. We are also proud to have 34 local apprentices contributing to the project's development – continuing our focus on helping individuals to gain practical experience and secure employment with Balfour Beatty and their supply chain partners.

Construction of the new prison is progressing steadily. Internally, installation and commissioning of mechanical and electrical systems is well under way. Externally, feature

cladding is being fitted over the coming weeks, and landscaping works are scheduled to begin in late spring. Recruitment activity is also ramping up. HMP Highland is on track to create more than 75 new employment opportunities across a wide range of roles.

Prison officer recruitment began in 2025 and will continue to grow significantly throughout 2026. Keep an eye out for our upcoming MFR radio adverts and join us at the HMP Inverness open day in April to learn more about careers with us.

Parklands to Invest £18 Million Expanding Care Provision

Parklands Care Homes is set to make its largest-ever investment in care provision across the north and north-east of Scotland, including a new 60-bed purpose-built home in Turriff (pictured). The £13 million development will meet growing demand in Aberdeenshire, where the population of people over 65 is projected to rise by 23% by 2028.

The Turriff home will follow the model of Parklands' acclaimed Pittyvaich Care Home in Inverness, featuring a salon, café, activities room, multiple day/dining areas, and outdoor terraces. Subject to planning approval, it is scheduled to open in summer 2027 as Parklands' 14th care home and second in Aberdeenshire.

Meanwhile, expansions are planned across the Parklands group, with 34 additional beds earmarked for Innis Mhor in Tain, Lynemore in Grantown, Eilean Dubh in Fortrose, Weston View in Keith and Deveron Way in Huntly.

Ron Taylor, Managing Director, said, "This investment demonstrates our commitment to delivering high-quality, sustainable care within local communities. With more than 30 years' experience caring for older people in remote and rural areas, we know how important it is for residents to stay close to family and friends while receiving the care they need."

Inverness IT Company Rebrands as WePurpose

Inverness-based IT company The Apprentice Store has rebranded as WePurpose as it marks its tenth anniversary this year. The organisation provides managed IT support, cybersecurity advice and web development services to businesses and charities across the UK.

The rebrand introduces a new WePurpose group structure designed to strengthen its commercial services, wider mission, and fuel growth. Under this model, WePurpose Technology will operate as the commercial IT services company delivering professional technology solutions to organisations, while WePurpose is the charitable arm focusing on creating employment pathways for people who face barriers to entering the workforce. Profits from the commercial activity will help fund this work, allowing the organisation to grow the business and expand its impact.

Founded in 2016 and currently with nine staff members, over the years the organisation has successfully employed and trained 29 people, most of whom have gone on to carve out very successful careers in the IT industry.

The organisation hosts its annual WePurpose Supporter Awards, which celebrate businesses fuelling its continued growth by purchasing services or referring work, supporting more than one week of an apprentice's salary. Businesses contributing to 25% of a salary or more are awarded Bronze, Silver, Gold or Platinum diamonds.

Belladrum Tartan Heart Festival

Belladrum Festival is a family-friendly music and arts event held each summer on the Belladrum Estate, just outside Inverness. Now in its 22nd year, it has grown from a small gathering into one of Scotland's best-loved festivals, welcoming tens of thousands of people to the Highlands each summer.

While many may know Belladrum for its music line-up, the festival offers a much broader experience. Alongside internationally recognised artists, the event features a wide-ranging programme of arts, culture and entertainment, with everything from theatre and workshops to children's activities and wellbeing spaces. There's an impressive 14 stages on site! This diverse offering has helped shape Belladrum's reputation as a festival that appeals to all ages, particularly families.

What's less widely known is that, behind the scenes, Belladrum is run year-round and day-to-day by a very small local team of three: Producer Dougie Brown, Festival Coordinator Naomi Hollas, and Cairan Macleod who looks after marketing and communications.

The scale of the festival means that collaboration is essential. In the lead-up, Belladrum Estate is transformed into a fully functioning event site – bringing together staging, infrastructure, catering, retail and production to create a temporary "town" in the Highlands. Local businesses play a vital role in making this happen, and wherever possible, the festival continues to work with suppliers from across the region.

Dougie Brown, Events Producer, said, "As a new member of Inverness Chamber of Commerce, we're looking forward to building stronger connections within the local business community. We've already seen the value of being part of the network, including welcoming fellow Chamber member The Gadget Refuge Highlands and Islands on board as one of our partners as we prepare for the 2026 festival.

You may also spot us at upcoming Chamber events, we're keen to get to know other members, share ideas and explore opportunities to work together!

At its heart, Belladrum is about bringing people together, whether that's audiences, artists or businesses. We're proud to be part of the Highland business community and look forward to continuing to work alongside local partners as we plan for the future.

From its base on the Isle of Skye, R.HOUSE has developed a distinctive approach to delivering homes for rural Scotland – bringing architecture, manufacturing and construction together within one integrated business. Specialising in off-site prefabricated timber housing, the company designs and builds sustainable homes across the Highlands and Islands for private clients, community groups and development partners.

At the heart of R.HOUSE is the long-standing collaboration between award-winning architects Rural Design and specialist builders James MacQueen Building Contractors. By combining architectural design, planning knowledge and construction expertise under one roof, the business can guide projects from early site appraisal and planning through manufacture and construction to the delivery of a fully completed home.

Managing Director Kirsty MacKinnon believes this integrated model is central to how the company delivers successful projects.

Kirsty explains, "Having architects and builders working together from the very beginning makes a huge difference. Design decisions, planning considerations and buildability all inform each other, giving clients much greater clarity around cost, programme and delivery."

This joined-up approach also helps unlock challenging rural sites. By combining planning insight, architectural thinking and construction expertise from the outset, R.HOUSE can respond to complex landscapes, infrastructure constraints and planning requirements all whilst giving clients greater confidence around cost and delivery.

Founded in 2010, R.HOUSE was created in response to the realities of building in rural and island environments. Remote logistics, complex planning contexts and challenging weather all shape how housing must be delivered across the Highlands. Rather than designing every project from scratch, the team refined recurring architectural principles into a panelised off-site construction system that balances efficiency with individuality.

Homes are manufactured locally at the company's Skye facility before being transported to site, where the prefabricated structure can be erected rapidly.

Kirsty says, "One of the things people notice straight away is the speed. You can drive past a site one day and see scaffolding – and the next day there's a house standing there. Getting a building wind and watertight so quickly makes a huge difference in Highland weather."

R.HOUSE offers a genuine turnkey service, managing the entire journey from site appraisal and planning through to final completion. The company also delivers Wind & Weathertight structural packages for private clients, allowing homeowners to benefit from the speed and quality of the off-site system while managing internal finishes themselves.

While the construction system is carefully systemised, every home is designed in response to its site – meaning no two R.HOUSES are ever identical. Place-led design sits at the core of the approach, considering landscape, topography, weather exposure and views so buildings sit comfortably within their surroundings.

Material quality and craftsmanship are equally important. Durable materials such as locally sourced Highland larch are selected for their longevity and ability to weather naturally in the landscape, while careful detailing and high-performance construction create homes that feel both robust and quietly refined.

Beyond individual homes, the system has also proven effective for larger developments. R.HOUSE works with architects, community trusts and development partners to deliver master-planned housing, community-led developments and affordable homes across rural Scotland.

Since launching in 2010, R.HOUSE has delivered or commenced more than 250 homes across Scotland, reflecting the company's growing role in providing high-quality housing solutions for rural communities.

Today R.HOUSE remains a proud family-owned business, rooted in Skye, employing local teams and investing in apprenticeships, skills development and manufacturing facilities. Through membership of the Chamber of Commerce, the company values the opportunity to connect with fellow businesses and contribute to resilient local economies and communities.

Trees for Life

Trees for Life is a pioneering rewilding charity, committed to creating nature-rich landscapes across the Highlands. Focusing on Scotland's spectacular Caledonian forest, our mission is to restore biodiversity, enable natural processes and create thriving habitats for both wildlife and people. From iconic species like the red squirrel to the potential return of missing species such as the lynx, we are working to bring more life back to our landscapes and support a more resilient future.

As a charity, Tree for Life focusses on three main programmes of work – Rewilding Landscapes, Missing Species and Rewilding People. The latter is a key element of our mission, and informs many of the projects we work on, including Rewilding Weeks, Rewild and Recover and educational outreach. In March this year, we were delighted to take part in a pilot project in collaboration with UHI, where people living with dementia joined us at Dundreggan for an immersive three-day experience designed to support physical, social and mental wellbeing. It's a great example of how nature-based experiences can deliver meaningful benefits beyond conservation alone.

Working in partnership is a key part of how we operate in the Highlands, and we're always keen to explore collaborations with like-minded organisations. As members of the Inverness Chamber of Commerce, we've found real value in the connections it enables. Over the past year, we've strengthened existing relationships and built new ones through events, networking lunches and speed networking sessions – all of which offer great opportunities to share ideas and build meaningful connections.

In June 2025, we were pleased to host a Behind the Scenes event at our flagship rewilding estate, Dundreggan, welcoming Chamber members to see our work first-hand on what turned out to be a beautifully sunny day.

We were also proud to be the Chamber's designated charity partner during Highland Business Week in September, which gave us a fantastic platform to speak directly with local businesses and share more about our work.

Restoring nature is a shared endeavour, and we are fortunate to have the support of a growing number of businesses across the Highlands. Increasingly, organisations are recognising the value of working with charities like Trees for Life to contribute to nature recovery, climate action and community wellbeing.
